AN EXPERIMENT

An experiment was last week tried at Llanelly by Mr. Henry Vivian, engineer to Mr. Trevethick's patent engines, by working the same with stone coal; which predicts an acquisition to the proprietors of those works hitherto unexpected. This experiment, we understand, has been un-successfully tried under boilers constructed in the ordinary way. The engine performed its operation for six hours with the greatest exactness, only consuming 1 cwt. 3qrs. of coal during that time, and. executing the duty of four horses; nor did the fire require to be disturbed to maintain its heat, as requisite in the use of other coal. We have, therefore, every reason

to suppose the success of this experiment arises from the formation of the fire-place, which materially differs from any other we have seen; and we trust this intelligence will prove of some moment to those gentlemen who possess such property, particularly in inland situations.—We shall enlarge on this interesting subject when a further opportunity offers.

To the Parishes of LLANLLY, LLANGENNECH and PEMBREY.

There can be but one just reason why the Mail-Coach should not run through Llanelly, a place of great and increasing trade, very much inconveniencing that trade by the delay of twenty-four hours in the transmission and arrival of their nail-letters, together with an, unnecessary extra expence incurred by the occasion of a bye-post. Having failed by frequent private complaints, I now publicly give notice to the above parishes, that it is my determination to attempt to remove that only just reason, by presenting at the next Michaelmas Quarter-Session, (in scandalous condition) the road between Llanelly and Pont-ar-Dylas, and the road from Straddy-Hill to the bottom of Pembrey Mountain, unless put into thorough repair prior to the period I have herein mentioned: Further, if the Bridge of the much-neglected town of Llanelly (by its inhabitants), also a small bridge, between the Falcon-inn and the Turnpike-Gate, have not immediate proper safe-guards put to them, I shall present them at the next Easter Quarter-Sessions.

In this wish of bringing the Mail through Llanelly and Kidwelly, I beg to be understood, if opposed by measurement. which was before determined in favour of the Llanon Road, that the chain, then employed on the occasion being made of thwarty iron, between Pont-ar-Dylas and Llanelly, will be deemed unserviceable and unfit for a similar trial.

BUTTER DRIVEN ASHORE

COURT OF KING'S BENCH, Nov. 21.

VERB v. LORD CAWDOR AND ANOTHER.

This was an action for damages, on account of the defendant's game-keeper having shot 1 and killed the plaintiff's dog. The plea was, that the defendant, Lord Cawdor was Lord of a manor, at Kidwelly, in the county of Carmarthen, and that the other defendant was his Lordship's game-keeper ; that the plaintiff's dog came upon that manor, and was following a hare, and might then and there have killed the said hare ; that the gamekeeper shot, the said dog, as it was lawful for him to do. To which plea there was a demurrer.

Lord Ellenborough, by way of shewing the absurdity of this plea, said—"I think the plea does not justify the killing of the gate-keeper; is it to be endured that a

man's dog, or any other animal, shall be shot because he follows a hare, without stating in the justification of killing that dog it was necessary to kill it; or that the dog belonged to an unqualified person, and was pursuing game Unlawfully? All this, or some of this was surely necessary to be stated."

Mr. Scarlet quoted several cases as analogous to this plea, and one, from the precedent of which this case had actually been drawn.

Lord Eilenborough— "Upon this plea, the question is, whether the dog incurs the penalty of death for running after a hare, in the manor of another. This case, upon this plea, has nothing to do with properly in game, nor with any right that may be delegated, by a Lord of the manor, or any other qualified person, to a game-keeper ; but it is the simple case of one animal running after another; and the question is, if a question it can be called, whether the animal so pursuing another, may legally be killed, without stating that the act of killing him was necessary.
